# One Decision MADE ALL THE DIFFERENCE

to persevere. It's this spirit that is forming Candance into the woman, mother, and employee she always knew she could be.

Candance was introduced to Women's Resource Center when she was incarcerated in the Kent County Correctional Facility. Candance admits to joining New Beginnings, WRC's job readiness program for incarcerated women, as a way to pass the time. But it did so much more for her. "It was one of the best decisions I've ever made. Being a part of the program gave me something positive to look forward to each week," explained Candance.

"Since I've been a participant with WRC, I have accomplished so much," added Candance. She said the employability classes and information about community resources helped her prepare for her release. She also appreciated learning about different coping skills and how to deal with her anger issues. Candance believes New Beginnings created a safe place to express her thoughts and emotions about her upcomingre-entry into the community.

After Candance was released, she began meeting regularly with her Training to Work Career Coach Tia over the course of this 18-week job training program. During this time, Tia recommended Candance create a résumé – so she did. Tia urged Candance to complete a certified customer service

training course – so she did. Training to Work funds covered the costs for the Rise Up Certification in Customer Service and Sales which Candance completed. Tia said, "Candance really took ownership of her own success." She was very self-motivated and eager to complete whatever training or tasks were asked of her.

Candance said WRC offered the kind of support she needed. "WRC helped me with references, interview clothing, bus tickets, gift cards and diapers for my one-year-old twins, and most importantly, emotional support and encouragement."

Candance says it is this personal approach that sets WRC apart. She said her Career Coaches have been supportive every step of the way. "They are always available and get things done in a timely manner. They go above and beyond to help me succeed, and I never feel judged for my past when dealing with them."

The amount of progress Candance has made in the last eight months is tremendous. She recently accepted a new position with Mercy Health, which offers a work schedule that is more conducive to her raising her family. Candance has already enrolled at Grand Rapids Community College to pursue an associate degree in Human Resources this fall.

Candance credits the New Beginnings program for helping her become self-sufficient and avoid becoming a repeat offender. She is grateful that WRC is here to offer support. "It is all a blessing and helps us as women to grow and become self-sufficient, functioning members of society again."



# ASSET LIMITED, INCOME CONSTRAINED, EMPLOYED


Working households throughout our state find themselves unable to cover the cost of basic living expenses.

Single working women are hit the hardest; stuck in low wage jobs and not earning enough to cover the increasing costs of housing, food, transportation and health care. The 2019 ALICE report brings to light the reality of households earning income above the federal poverty level but less than the basic cost of living.

## According to the 2019 Michigan ALICE Report:

### Over 50% of women come to WRC earning \$15,000 or less annually

\$21,624 is considered the bare minimum a **single adult** needs to live and work in Kent County. This basic budget does not allow for saving opportunities and leaves households with little cushion for emergency expenses.



# 9%

#### 9% of people working in Michigan are underemployed

Many of the women we serve are underemployed, meaning they work less than 35 hours a week, despite wanting to work full time. And while the state's unemployment rate is low, the majority of recent job gains are for jobs paying less than \$16 an hour.



# 50% of households struggling to afford basic needs are single women and their families

We see many of these ALICE households represented in the women WRC serves. It's a challenge for many to afford housing, child care, food, transportation, and health care for themselves and their children.

The findings of the ALICE report, while alarming, reinforce the need for WRC's services. Women need allies as they strive to improve their economic situation. It's the reason our personal, holistic approach to workforce development helps women believe in themselves and in their ability to find ongoing success at work and at home.
